Reading Response Journal Questions Students respond for approximately five minutes in a writing journal to a question posted in class prior to reading. Each day students read, then post in their journal the date, title of what they've been reading, page numbers completed (from page # **reading response questions freebie**

How to write a reader response paper Prof. Margaret O'Mara

Sample format for a reader response paper of 4-5 pages: 1 Introduction/theme: 1-2 paragraphs that "set the stage" for what will follow Possible entry points include: a broader trend that interests you in American history and how this book's contents explain it; another book (or school of thought) that this book either supports or

Students can apply reader response theory when they respond to literature by writing and participating in instructional conversations (Tompkins, 2006) To promote this type of critical reader response by undergraduate students, I have gathered a variety of reading/writing prompts to dovetail with out-of-class reading assignments

reader-response theory, the use of literature in English as a foreign language classes and its relation to critical thinking Results showed that the application of tasks based on the reader-response theory encourages a meaning seeking process as well as the development of higher order thinking skills in future language teachers

The What, Why, When and How of Reading Response Journals

within reading response journals, three items should appear on each page: the date, the title, and the author of the book Title and author are needed so that students and teacher can refer to the book later (Parsons, 1990) The content of a reading response journal can be decided by the teacher
