### **A Short History of High-Stakes Testing**

high-stakes testing, it is easy for these folks to defend their use Fifth is the fit between high-stakes testing and other spectacles enjoyed by the public, such as baseball, football, basketball, and hockey We are a game-playing, competition-seeking nation, and high-stakes testing fits easily into such a culture

### **High-Stakes Testing: The Student Voice**

What started out as standardized testing later changed into high-stakes testing The high-stakes were created by tying student test scores to promotions within Chicago Public Schools (CPS) If a student did not meet a predetermined test score, they attended summer school to obtain the successful score If the student did not meet the score

examine whether academic achievement increased after high-stakes were attached to tests in grades 1-8 If academic achievement did not change after stakes were attached to a state test or if achievement decreased, the effectiveness of the high-stakes policy as a means of improving student performance must be called into question

Another problem with high-stakes testing is the narrowing of the curriculum Unfortunately, high-stakes testing places a heightened concern with test data; thus, teachers are no longer concerned with discovering and fostering individual learning styles (Paris, 2000) Because teachers have been forced to directly

than in schools that were similar but for the high stakes test requirement" (Shriberg & Shriberg, 2006) Anxiety Interference Elevated stress and anxiety levels in students have been reported due to high-stakes testing (Jones, Jones & Hargrove, 2003) This elevated stress may increase the likelihood that students will drop out of school

### **The Inevitable Corruption of Indicators and Educators ...**

These two criticisms of what we now call high-stakes testing were made before modern testing systems had gained admiration for their beneficial effects on education, and when a crisis seemed quite far away Therefore the minor worries of an individual here and there, over the last century, were easily set aside But today, high-stakes testing

### **Consequences of High-Stake Testing**

Though high-stakes testing is not new to education, in 2001, it became national policy as a result of the No Child Left Behind Act The goal is this act was to better the education system in the United States The paper examines the many positive and negative consequences of high-stakes testing

736% males The majority of participants (908%) were Hindu, 57% were Christians, and 34% were Muslims The standard of living of our participants can be best described by their level of education and type of possessions Participants in this experiment had, on average, 5.6 years of education, and 26.4% had no formal education

### **"Interim" Assessments and ESSA**

These high stakes were almost certainly a factor in the increased local use of interim tests from publishers and from the states themselves for purposes of preparation for end-of-year testing and early warning—ie, the identification of students or curricular topics requiring extra attention before the high-stakes summative testing
